
Interreg IPA programmes strand A








Interreg IPA programmes strands B & C

IPA Adrion -> supports EUSAIR -> its post 2020 IPA allocation has been multiplied by 351% vs 2014-2020
 -> main purpose: higher degree of territorial integration

Boosting exchanges among EU Officials and Young People



Recommendation 1: Increasing the number of online events and meetings via digital platforms

Summary:

- Since the start of the pandemic, strong increase of online events. Even though most programmes consider physical meetings crucial, hybrid events will be kept by most (easy access for all).
- Digital tools and social media are widely used through all the programmes. Some use youthfriendly/easier language in social media. Most programmes communicate in English, only a few in national languages.
- Agenda and timeline are made available in advance if necessary (depending on the meeting).
- Recommendation largely taken into account by the Programmes

Recommendation 2: Planning regular thematic meetings on Interreg matters with young people and European Commission's staff specialised in territorial cooperation

Summary:

- Not done at the level of Managing Authorities can be done by project partners on a voluntary basis
- The initiative should come from the European Commission (clear recommendation/guidelines)
- Consensus on the need to raise awareness on Interreg matters should be given priority at EU Level

Recommendation 3: Involving young people in meetings of relevant EU-wide groups and networks

Summary:

- No direct contact with young people only via the projects if young people are the final recipients or target groups
- Young people are not involved in meetings with relevant Commission staff and EU-wide groups and networks (e.g. Interreg Annual meetings) due to limited number and required expertise of participants
- Young people could be invited as observers

Recommendation 4: Enabling young people to encourage their region to apply for the REGIOSTARS Award competition and consider keeping a category dedicated to youth every year

Summary:

- Promotion to the general public through their usual means of communication
- No specific communication to young people ('no positive discrimination')

Recommendation 5: Further promoting the regular exchanges within existing governance structures like the Macro Regional Strategies, at regional level and make sure that NGOs are also part of those exchanges

Summary:

- Only a few Managing Authorities actively pursue further exchanges with existing governance structures
- NGOs not always involved
- No regular dialogue with young people

Boosting communication towards Young People via educational programmes



Recommendation 6: Increasing the knowledge of Interreg in schools and universities

Summary:

- Schools and universities are often stakeholders or project partners
- Organisation of conferences, lectures, trainings and awareness raising activities in schools and university premises
- Specific focus on universities and schools given in the context of the European Year of Youth
- Recommendation largely taken into account by the Programmes

Colour Code: Green



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Recommendation 7: Encouraging European Commission's staff to boost their participation to the "Back to School/ University" initiative and students to pro-actively contact and invite EU staff to go visit their school and university

Summary:

- European Commission should be the facilitator of the initiatives
- Awareness of the initiative and willingness to participate, but often managed by different public authorities

Recommendation 8: Creating and disseminating dedicated "edutainment" programme on territorial cooperation via Interreg projects or with massive open online courses (MOOC) that may interest students and teachers

Summary:

- Some Managing Authorities are implementing innovative initiatives (quizzes on Interreg)
- Willingness to do more in this regard with some guidance and support from the European Commission

Enabling Young People to take action within Interreg programmes and projects



Recommendation 9: Encouraging each Interreg programme to plan more calls more easily accessible by young people with simpler rules and a dedicated budget

Summary:

- Managing Authorities largely help (all) applicants via tutorials, trainings, Info Days
- Simplification of language and reduction of administrative burden to the extend possible
- No 'positive discrimination' towards young people, but could indirectly benefit from inclusion in specific objectives
- New emphasis planned in the new programming period
- Should be given priority at EU Level appear as one of criteria for programming

Recommendation 10: Inviting young people in meetings and enable them to actively participate to the monitoring committees

Summary:

- No foreseen mandate for young people
- Participation is limited to the voting members
- Observation status could be envisaged

Colour Code: Purple



Recommendation 11: Mobilising resources for the Interreg priority objective related to boosting skills and tackling youth unemployment

Summary:

- Facilitation of job matching is not a priority
- Some Managing Authorities publish vacancies on their website
- Employment is supported indirectly through trainings which prepare for the labour market
- Specific objective indirectly connected to employment via support to businesses/SMEs
- Should be given priority at EU Level

Recommendation 12: Boosting more EU inter-institutional and multi-governance relations, dialogues and actions on young people's role and needs linked to Interreg

Summary:

- No action has been taken in this regard
- Recognition of young people added value
- Should be given priority at EU Level clear regulation and accompanying guidelines
- More capacity would be needed to implement this recommendation

Overall results and novelties for better youth involvement



Main Challenges for Youth Participation

- Economic barriers: limited economic resources, including high costs of political engagement and a lack of funding mechanisms for youth engagement activities
- Available opportunities: lack of opportunities allowing meaningful participation, including provided by authorities and addressing youth interests and needs
- **Distrust**: distrust in public institutions and decision-making processes, sceptical about whether their actions will be considered/followed by the public authorities
- Information: lack of adequate information on opportunities of youth participation



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To support young people participation in European Territorial Cooperation (ETC), what should be prioritised by the EU to have the greatest impact?

- **Capacity-Building:** Support capacity-building activities to improve competences and skills for young people and youth organisations involved in ETC
- Youth Structures: Foster the development of and provide support to new or existing independent youth organisations and structures involved in ETC
- Equal access and inclusion: Implement and promote actions to ensure equal access to opportunities for young people to engage in interregional cooperation
- Youth Participation in decision-making: Promote the participation of youth in engaging with decisionmakers in planning and delivering on ETC's policies and programmes
- Awareness raising campaigns: Implement and support awareness raising campaigns on the importance of meaningful youth participation in ETC
- Youth Participation in the programme cycle: Foster meaningful and inclusive youth participation and empowerment in all phases of design, implementation and projects
- Youth mainstreaming: Promote youth mainstreaming (youth reflected in all thematic areas) in ETC
